A MESSAGE FROM MARTIN LANGSDON, COMMUNITY GOVERNOR

I am Dr Martin Langsdon and I am a Community governor here at Sheringham High School. I was previously a parent governor here when the second of my two sons was a pupil at the school. I have lived in Sheringham for the last twenty years and I am also a Sheringham Town Councillor.

Among other work, I was a secondary school teacher for twenty-three years and also worked as a lecturer in the school of Education at UEA in Norwich. As a Head of Department in secondary schools in Essex, I became used to working closely with the school SENCO from the start of my teaching career. I learned the significance of learning resources and strategies being adapted to the diverse learning needs of young people in the school.

As the member of the school's governing body, I am the governor whose role it is to link up with the school's SEND department. The school's governing body has a responsibility to;

- Make the necessary special educational provision for any pupil with Special Educational Needs.
- Meet the needs of pupils with SEND.
- Make reasonable adjustments in line with the Equality Act 2010.
- Ensure that all pupils with SEND join in with the everyday activities of the school together with the children without SEND.
- Appoint a SENCO who has received appropriate training.
- Have a suitable and up-to-date SEN information report/policy, published on the website.

As the school's SEND Link governor, I have a responsibility to liaise with the school's SENCO and other SEND staff in order to help the governing board to remain up to date with all matters related to SEND. I have been most impressed by the work of the SEND department and by the ways in which the school seeks to incorporate awareness of special educational needs into all aspects of school life.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT DAYS!





















Towards the end of the summer term, our Year 7s, 8s, 9s and 10s enjoyed three days off curriculum and involved in a variety of exciting activities. Year 7 students visited Banham Zoo, and enjoyed a day at Sheringham Park, relishing activities such as fire lighting, shelter building and a walk to one of the many viewing towers. Their week finished in school, celebrating all things relating to the Day of the Dead by making masks, dance and music workshops, culminating in watching the animated film 'The Day of the Dead.'.Year 8 students also visited Sheringham Park, enjoyed an outdoor activity day at school which included wall/rock climbing, disc golf using a frisbee, fencing, circus skills and teamwork in designing and constructing a tower. There was a school-based activity, Trade Day, run by the English and Drama Departments. Students had to form their own business and use the resources that they had to make T-shirts. But they were working against a complex set of trading requirements and inflation, which meant they had to sharpen their negotiating skills to succeed. Students ended the day with a Dragons' Den style pitch to see whose business was most investable.















Year 9 students enjoyed the outdoor activities and the Trade Day at Sheringham High as above but also had a day trip to Holkham Hall, where they went on a deer safari and a bike ride round the beautiful grounds of Holkham, even spotting a red kite hunting high in the sky! They then headed for fun on the rope course - not for the faint hearted! They followed the trail of discovery through the treetops, over wobbly crossings and swinging bridges before getting their feet safely back on the ground with a descent down one of the two zip lines. Alternatively, some students took part in a master class in cake decorating with Mrs Chanter, learning how to make fondant; how to quilt fondant, create swags and bows and how to make sugar roses. The finished product was stunning!

Year 10s, depending on their GCSE subjects, took part in a varied programme of activities at school, including an Art and Photography workshop in collaboration with Holt Festival, a Uniformed Service Day, a lecture on immigration and the race riots in Notting Hill and 'Ready Steady Cook'. GCSE Geographers ventured along the coast to Overstrand. The Historians visited the Tower of London, where they saw Henry VIII's armour, visited Walter Raleigh's prison, spotted Tudor graffiti and climbed the ramparts, all in a spectacular setting next to the Thames and Tower Bridge. The afternoon was spent in Notting Hill, visiting the Portobello Road Market and visiting sites linked to the GCSE module on Migrants in Notting Hill. The next day, they were lucky enough to be visited by Tony Warner of Black History Walks, author and expert on Black History in Notting Hill. The students were fascinated by his accounts of key characters in the Migration story.

























PRESTIGIOUS INVITATION Mrs Fijalkowska

In October, Mrs Fijalkowska was invited to participate in a discussion about the paintings of the late Czech artist Eva Švankmajerová at Frieze Masters and The Gallery of Everything in London alongside the owner of the gallery and Professor Krzysztof Fijalkowski. The 2-hour discussion was lively and animated with stories of her life and conversations about her work. The talk was presented to a live audience. The event was filmed and will be posted to the gallery website once edited. Mrs Fijalkowska knew the artist Eva Švankmajerova personally and has exhibited and published alongside her in the past. Mrs Fijalkowska's essay about the paintings was recently published in America and Czechia. Tate has bought one of the paintings from Frieze, one of the biggest professional art fairs in the world this year.



CRIMINOLOGY Ms Shepherd

Year 12 Criminology students visited Norwich Magistrates Court to see the judicial process in action. Students are currently examining the pathway from the crime scene to the courtroom within their unit of work. We met with the court usher who explained the court system at Norwich to us and were then introduced to the barrister in the remand court, where sentences can range from fines and community service to being referred up to the Crown Court for more serious crimes with sentencing. Students also listened to hearings in the GAP court (quilty anticipated plea) where cases involving drugs, theft and speeding were heard. Seeing the court system in action was something that our students really enjoyed and an experience they will remember for a long time.

A LEVEL GEOGRAPHY AND BIOLOGY FIELD TRIPTO WALES

A Level geography students were joined by their biology counterparts for the first time for our annual visit to Betwsy-Coed in northern Wales to develop their fieldwork and practical skills. Despite the small cohort, students enjoyed a huge amount despite the 6am meet at school on the last week of term in July! The first two days orientated around data collection and analysis in upland areas; the highlight being a circumnavigation of Cwm Idwal, a corrie in the Snowdonia region which lent itself to some breathtaking views. Day 3 involved a visit to Llandudno to trial some human geography techniques in the birthplace of the story of Alice in Wonderland while the biologists focused on freshwater practical work. The penultimate day saw both groups of students head to the coast, with the weather in Criccieth a vast improvement on last year for the geographers, while the biologists explored sand dune profiles and characteristics near Anglesey. The final day saw us focus on river characteristics before the very warm 6 hour drive back to SHS. All students worked well and achieved a great deal which will support them with their NEA coursework write up and practical skills. A huge thanks to all the staff at the Field Study Centre for their tutoring as well as to Miss Lucas and Mr King for getting them all safely there and back! We look forward to visiting again in 2025.
